Political Ramifications by Congressional District (N=400 per district)



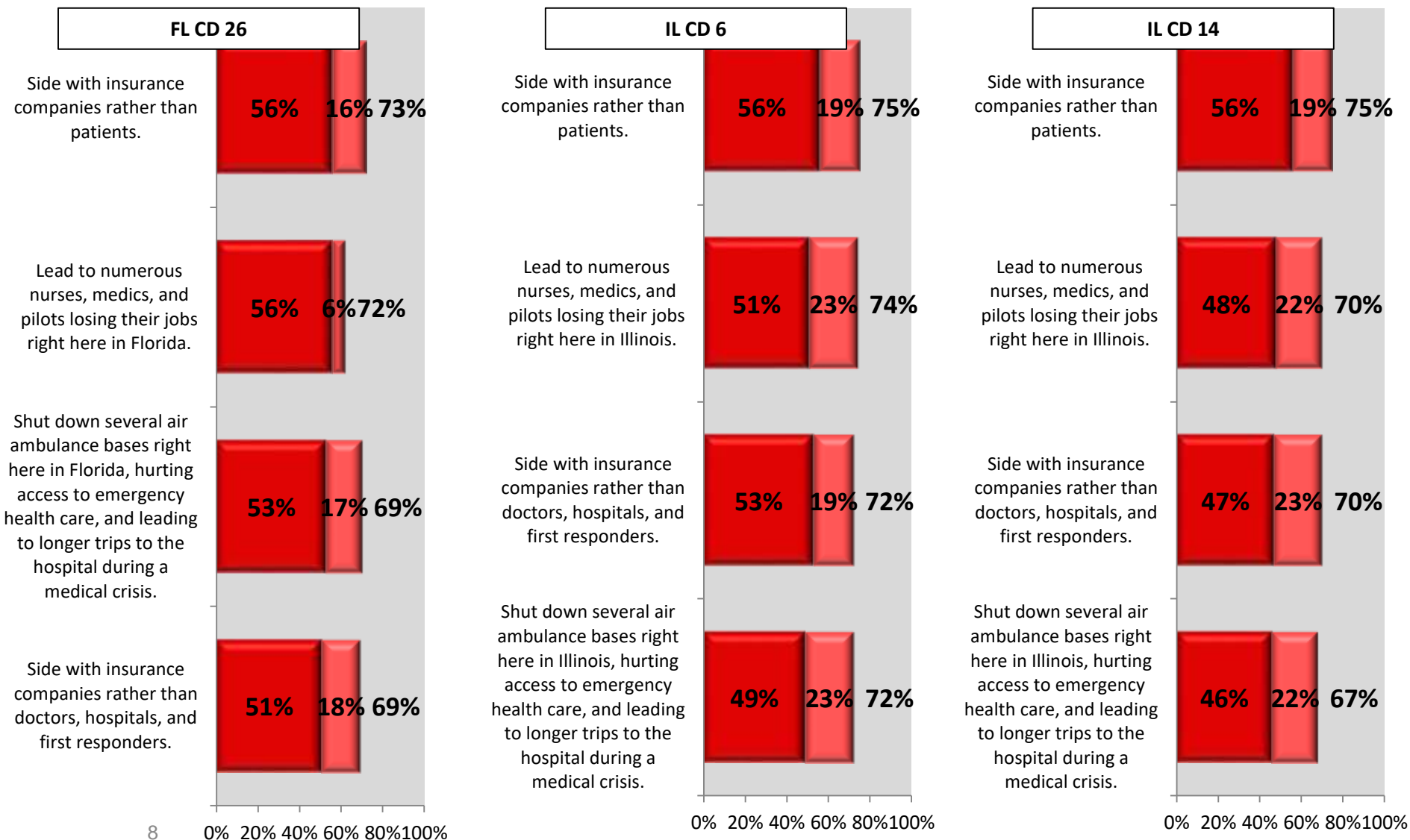

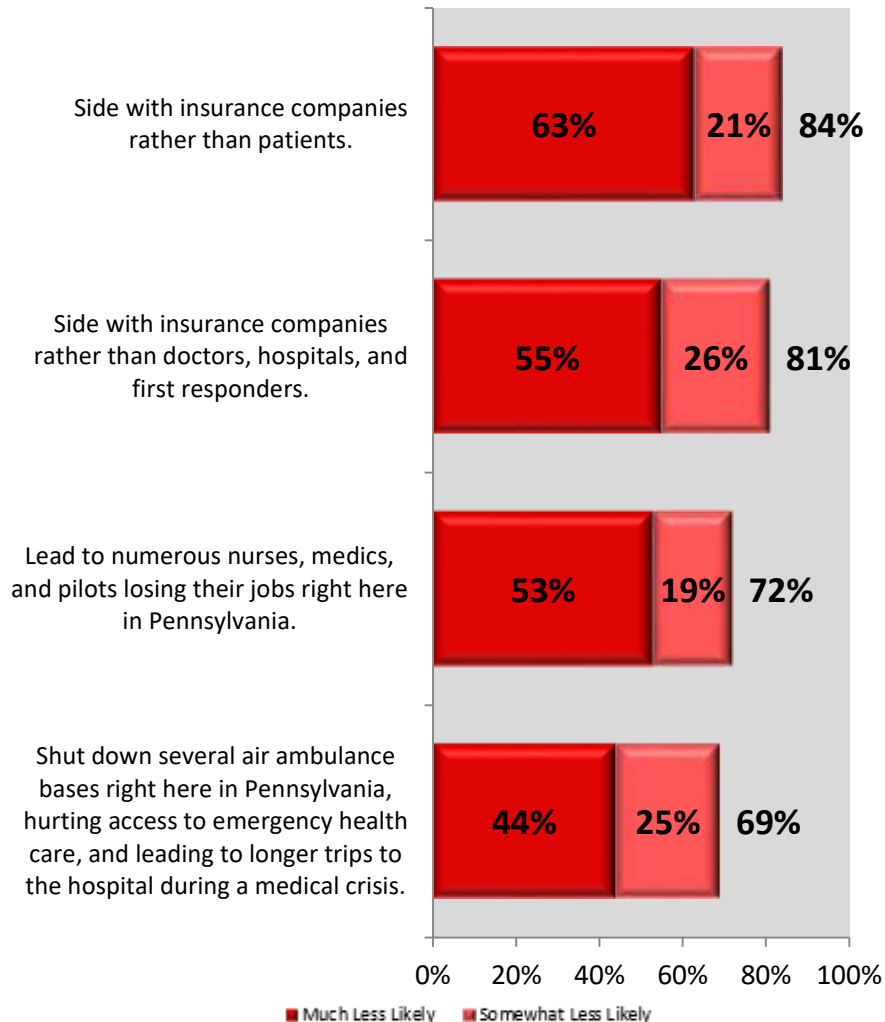

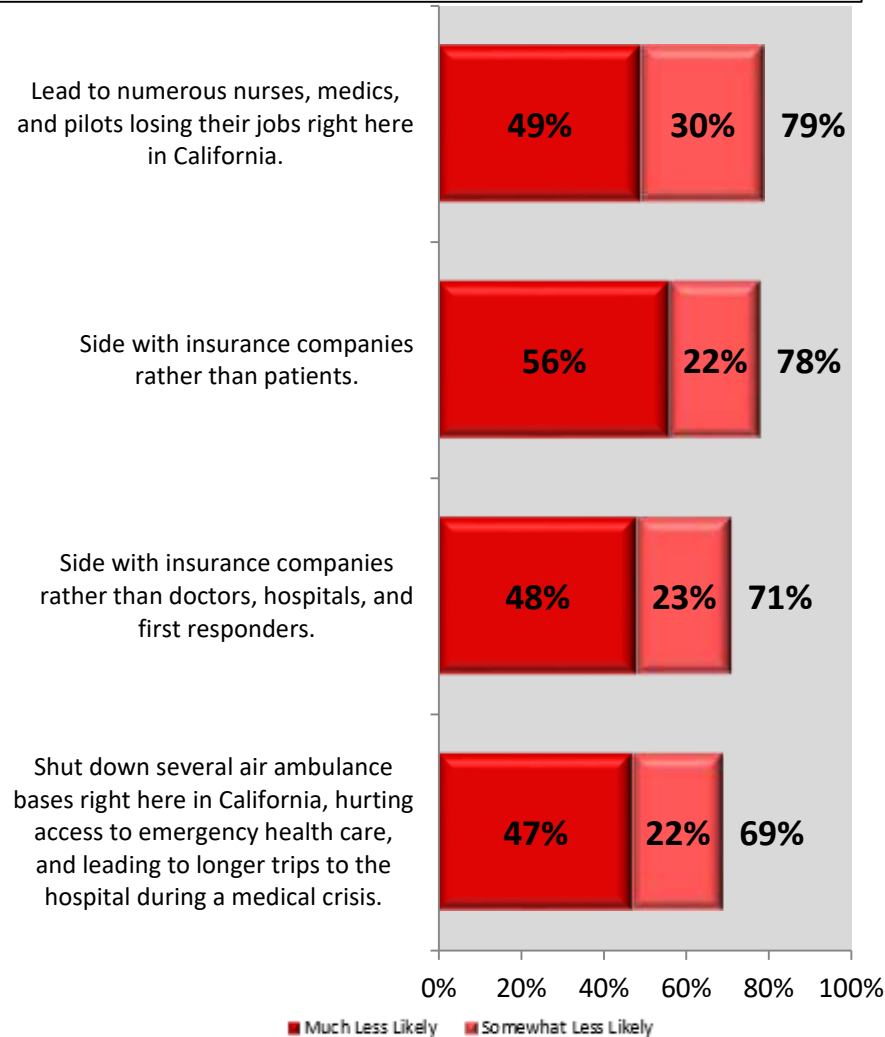

Percent of Approvers Who are Less Likely To Vote for Harder if They Knew That He Voted For a Bill that Would ...

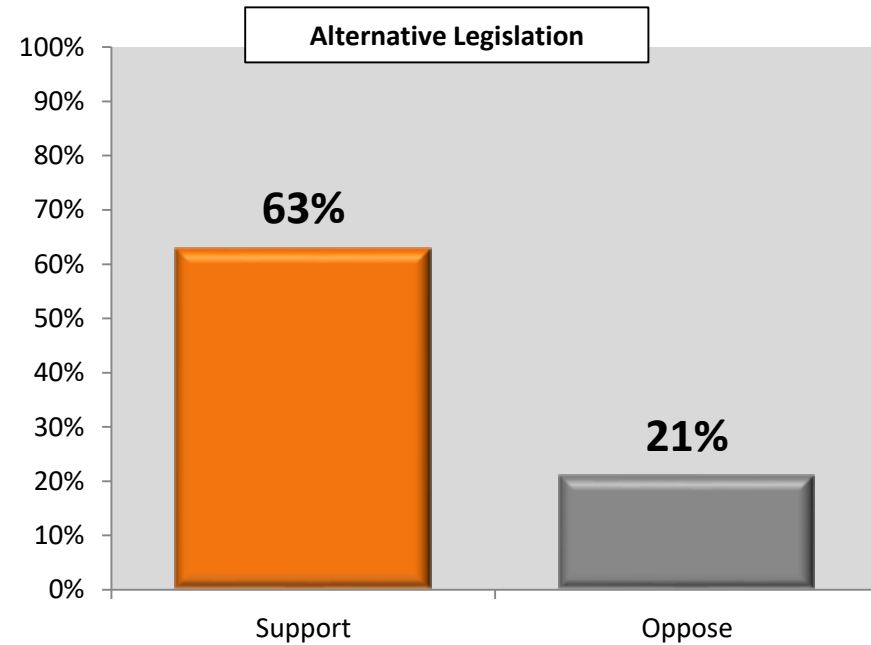
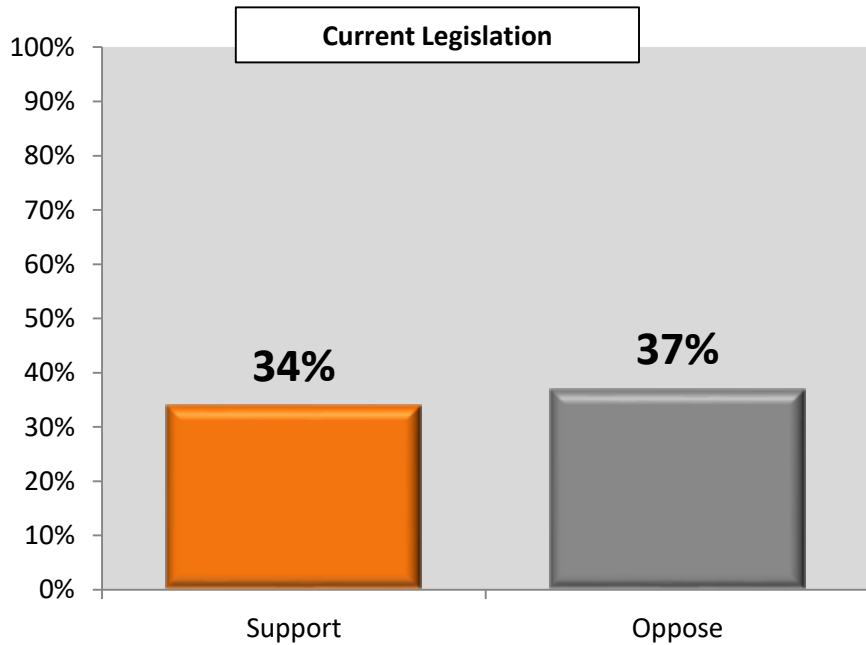
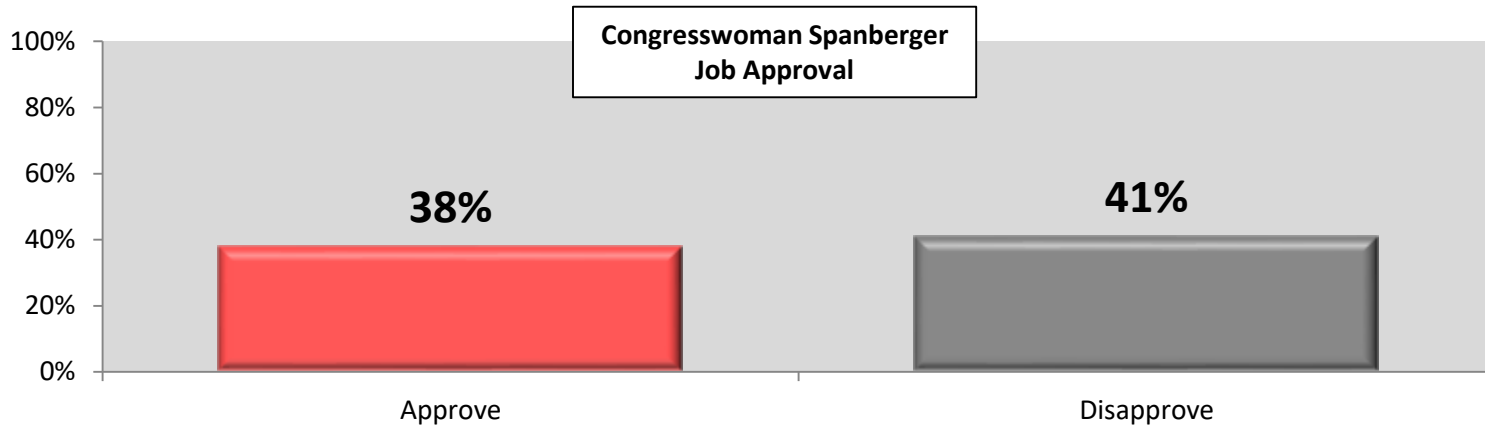

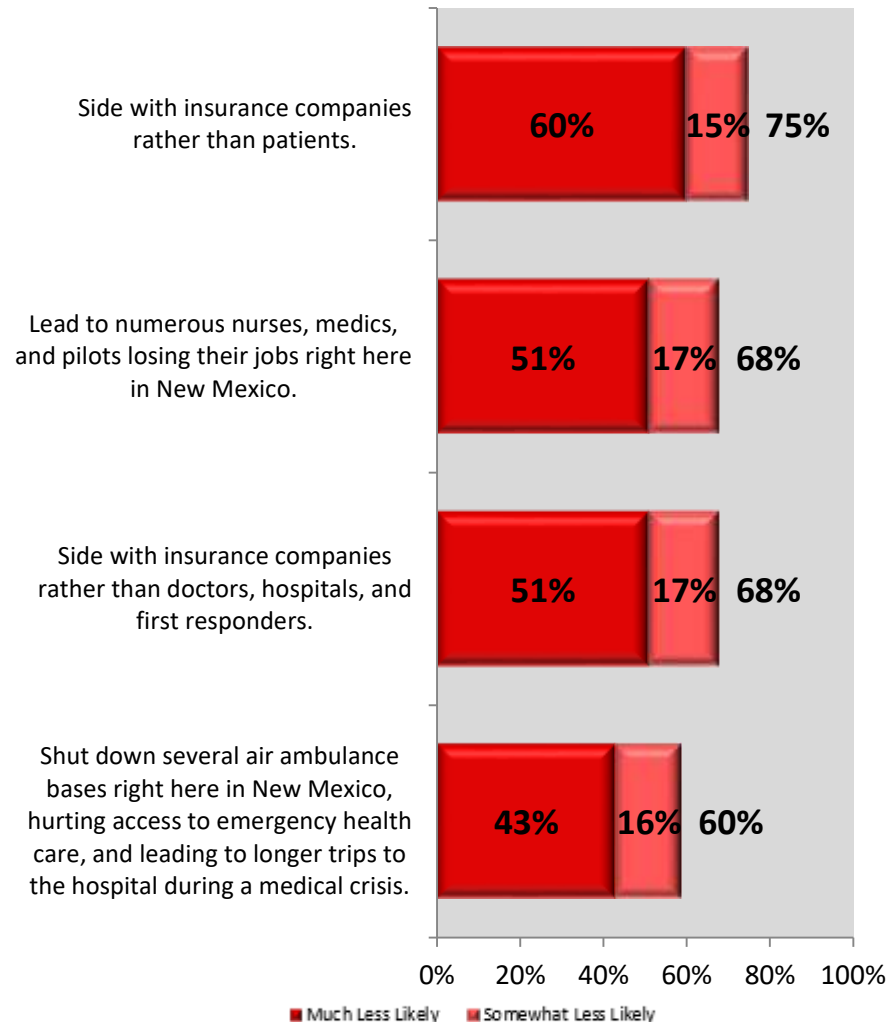

Percent of Approvers Who are Less Likely To Vote for Torres Small if They Knew That She Voted For a Bill that Would ...



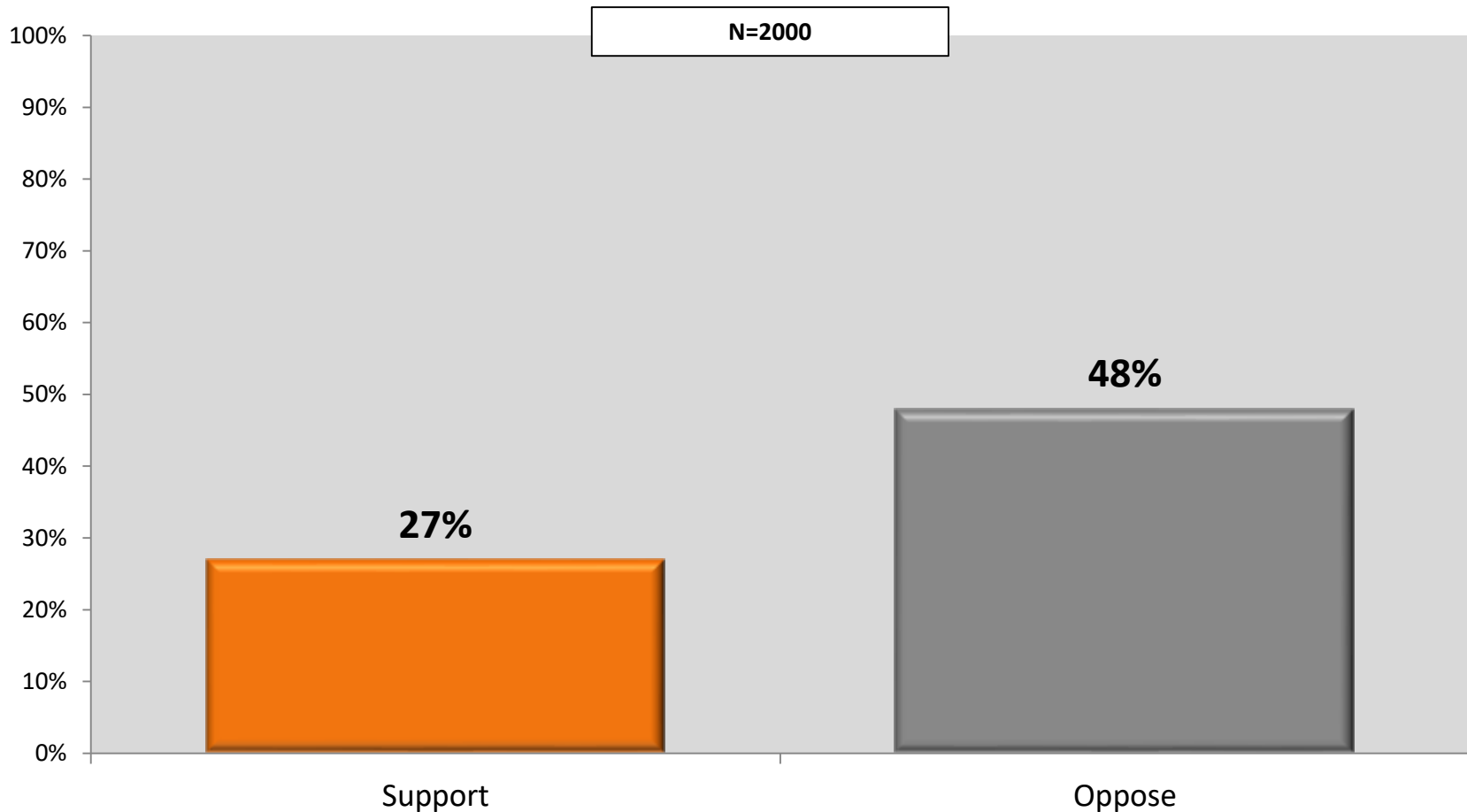

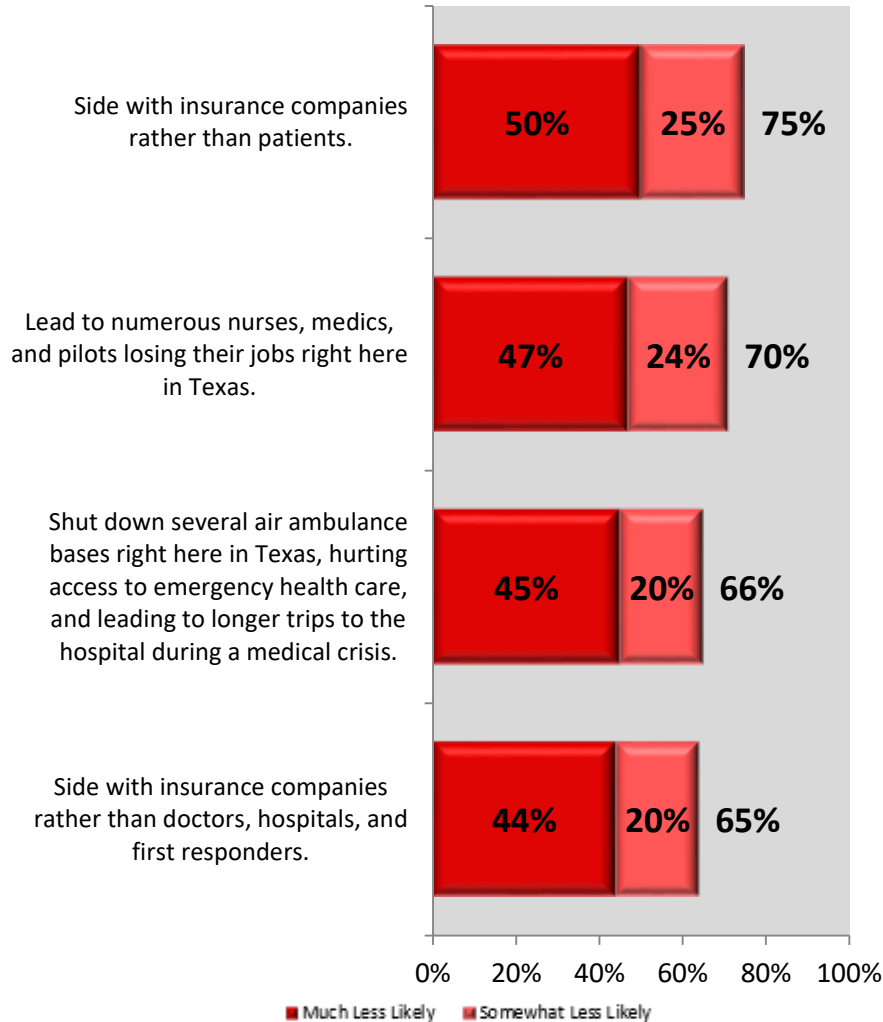
